Mark your calendar for a public lecture by civil rights activist Dolores Huerta, who will deliver the keynote address for Hispanic Heritage Month at Rutgers University–Camden.

Dolores Huerta has worked for labor rights and social justice for more than 50 years. In 1962, she and Cesar Chavez founded the United Farm Workers union; she played a critical role in many of the union's accomplishments for four decades. In 2002, she established the Dolores Huerta Foundation, which connects groundbreaking community-based organizing to state and national movements to register and educate voters; advocate for education reform; bring about infrastructure improvements in low-income communities; advocate for greater equality for the LGBT community; and create strong leadership development. She has received numerous awards, including the Eleanor Roosevelt Human Rights Award from President Clinton in 1998. In 2012, President Obama presented her with the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the highest civilian honor in the United States.
